

How to avoid five key mistakes with your new puppy



Welcome to our latest Down Dog Digest.

Read on to see what five mistakes you need to avoid with your new puppy.

Being a good family pet is the hardest job your puppy will ever have to do.

We want our pups to be quiet and settle down when we're busy - but raring to go when we want to play or take them out.

We want them to be happy to meet our friends, family and visitors- but to bark at burglars.

We need them to cope happily with the myriad of things they'll see, hear, meet and smell outside our homes when we take them places with usbut we also need them to stay happily at home when we go out.

It really is a tough job. Read on to find out about the FIVE biggest mistakes new puppy owners make so you can avoid them with your puppy.

The number one big mistake new puppy owners make is with **SOCIALISATION.** Too many people just throw their puppy into the maelstrom of everyday life without much thought.

You need your puppy to have positive, happy experiences with everybody and everything she sees, hears and meets.

Most importantly, your puppy needs to be happy and comfortable with people of all ages and types, from babies to older adults; people with glasses, beards, or hats; loud, confident people; shy people - the list is huge.

And the clock is ticking. Puppies who meet very few humans before they are 12 weeks old may never cope well with strangers.

Five puppy mistakes you should avoid



Just because your puppy is happy with your primary schoolage chidren, doesn't mean she'll cope with babies.

Just because she's happy with your gran and grandad doesn't mean she understands young men with beards.

Another big socialisation mistake is to allow your new puppy to play with other dogs. Your aim is for her to be happy and relaxed in the presence of other dogs.



Allowing puppies to play freely with other puppies and dogs creates an adult dog that is fixated with running up to any other dogs she sees – and she becomes a pest to others.

And it will mean training a reliable recall becomes a nightmare.

Your puppy needs to meet or see all sorts of other animals too and experience different surfaces, including slippery and shiny surfaces, stairs and steps. She needs to hear household and outside noises and to experience lots of different places. Download and check that list!

Using puppy pads for **HOUSETRAINING** is the second big mistake. Puppy pads encourage your puppy to eliminate on them - it's what they're for. But think about it - what you are actually training your pup to do is to pee and poo in your house.




Remember, puppies need to toilet very regularly - following play, exercise, meals, naps, and being released from a crate. Or every 60-90 minutes anyway!

The third big mistake involves something very normal for puppies, **BITING**. Oh, those sharp puppy teeth. All puppies bite. It's NORMAL. And some bite more than others.

Shouting at your puppy, smacking her on the nose, yelping or growling at her won't stop her biting - but it will spoil your relationship with her, and the damage might take many months or years to repair.

Instead, keep your hands still. Movement is likely to trigger more biting. Encourage her to bite toys and chews instead of you.



Five puppy mistakes you should avoid

The fourth big mistake is **NOT TOUCHING AND HANDLING** your puppy.

It doesn't take long for puppies to start to object to being touched around their tails and hindquarters, or messing about when you try to dry them.

This creates a problem that will cause you and your vet and groomer headaches for the rest of your puppy's life.

Make sure you touch, hold, massage and stroke her all over every day so she'll accept and enjoy all types of handling from friends, family members, vets and groomers.

The fifth and perhaps second biggest mistake is to **FEED YOUR PUP FROM A BOWL**. Food is essential for your puppy - and most puppies are ravenous when it comes to food.



Use this precious resource wisely. Don't waste it by feeding in a bowl.

Hand feed your puppy to build your relationship. Use food to reward her for toileting in the right place, for letting you brush her, for coming when called, and for anything she does that you like.

This time your challenge, should you wish to Roll balls accept it, is: PLAY with your puppy - but balance have FUN. it with enough REST.

PLAY is the best (and most fun) way to build your relationship with your puppy. Encourage her to play with toys with you - tug games are great fun - let her do the tugging and shaking if she wants.



Roll balls around and let her chase them. Just have FUN.

Make sure she gest enough REST too. When she's tired, put her in a quiet, safe place such as a crate to have a snooze.

Tempting though it is to cuddle her all the time, it's important that you practice leaving your puppy alone from an early age.

What do you need for a new pup?

Less than you think! You'll need:

- a soft collar and flat, 3 or 4 foot lead rather than an extending lead
- some soft bedding old towels or blankets are fine, unless you want a pretty dog bed of course
- a cardboard box for the first few nights, then a crate is a great idea. Let your pup get used



to her crate with all doors open at first. Give her a filled Kong or other food toy and she'll soon love it!

- some food try to feed the best quality you can afford
- a bowl for water (ditch the food bowl!)
- some toys, especially toys you can stuff with food, such as those in the pictures below





You'll also need:

- some pet cleaner and pet deoderiser to make sure you get rid of any scent after those little accidents.
- puppy pads for the first few nights in the crate only
